WHOLE PERSON CARE PRECEPTORSHIP**CONNECTING WITH PATIENTS**

Throughout the preceptorship, students learned how to take a patient's spiritual history in order to better care for emotional, mental, and spiritual needs. Haley Hagopian (Medical Student, Midwestern University) and Andrew Lew (Medical Student, William Carey University) were practicing this in a conversation with a patient. The patient started off by saying she was on a spiritual journey but didn't identify with a specific religion. They got to know the patient more and asked, "What resources would be helpful for you on this journey?" To their surprise, the patient responded, "A Bible." Haley happened to have her personal Bible in her pocket. She gifted it to the patient, pointing out the Gospel of John. The patient expressed how she was lonely and did not have much support, so Haley asked the patient if it would be helpful to hear about her faith. Upon the patient's consent, Haley and Andrew took the time to share how Jesus had worked in their lives. This experience was highly impactful to the patient, Andrew, and Haley.

**THE POWER OF A TESTIMONY**

"During my time at the hospital, I learned that as a physician, my own spiritual journey can be used to minister to my patients. After asking if it would be helpful to share a story of loss from my life, I saw a patient come to recognize how God meets us where we are and that a relationship with Him is the only sure thing in this world. After sharing my story, the patient opened up and shared his struggle with viewing his cancer as punishment from God. This revealed the true lament of his soul and his need for spiritual care during that visit. Through my testimony and truth from scripture, I was able to encourage the patient with the reminder that God is faithful to forgive when we repent and confess and that God will always be with us, because He loved first" (1 John 4:10).
